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Rev. Jonathan Page Senior Minister

What a year it has been at the Hills Church! I can't thank all of you enough for the warm welcome I have received this year. I have appreciated every meeting I have had with you and I look forward to building more and deeper relationships in 2024. It has been a true joy to be back at the Hills Church. I'm immensely excited for what lies ahead.

We have a lot to celebrate from this past year. Including confirmands, we welcomed twenty-six new members in 2023, which is the most new members in ten years. Our in-person attendance was its highest since 2019 and we had strong engagement for our online services. Our online numbers are consistently among the top congregations in the Southern New England Conference.

During Lent we had well attended and successful Wednesday night dinner and Taize services in Wallace Chapel. During the Easter season, we had a full range of programming that culminated in Confirmation and Volunteer Appreciation Sunday with our all-church picnic. Over the summer we instituted a series of summer suppers. The final supper at the parsonage had nearly ninety in attendance. This past fall we launched a small group ministry with a wide variety of offerings.

The biggest event of the year was our John Finney celebration weekend in June. We had the opportunity to thank John for his truly incredible ministry of thirty-nine years at the Hills Church. I personally am grateful for all John has done for me, particularly for his support this year. We are fortunate indeed to have found a worthy successor to John in our new Director of Music, Will Cooper. Will has stepped into his new role with enthusiasm and skill. The Chancel Choir's offering of Dixit Dominus for our Special Music Sunday was a testament to Will's hard work and dedication.

This fall Anne Marie Holloway and Judy Swahnberg both announced their upcoming departures from the Hills Church. I could not have asked for better colleagues. They are both supremely talented and I will miss them dearly. I celebrate Anne Marie's departure for the historic Allin Church in Dedham. They are lucky to have her and the skills she has nurtured at the Hills Church will continue to build the body of Christ in her new call. Thankfully, Judy still has more time with us and will officially retire in June. There will be ample time to celebrate her long history and transformative ministry in the months ahead.

As we look to 2024 there are several priorities for the continued health and growth of the Hills Church. The first priority will be filling the positions of Associate Minister. I'm grateful for those who have already been working hard on this process and I am optimistic about our ability to find the right candidates and structure for the church going forward.

Our second priority will be revising our programming through Faith Formation and Christian Service to find the best way to engage our membership, grow in faith, and serve our community. My goal is to find a consistent rhythm for the year that functions smoothly. Our collective goal should be to have the church run as effectively as possible where every board and team has a clear plan and vision and volunteer time is maximally valued.

Our final priority will be to continue to implement our new Realm database to support connections among members and the efficient running of the congregation. The progress on our database implementation has been slower than I hoped, but I am grateful for the Realm Implementation Team and the improvements we will see in the year ahead.

As we execute these priorities, I hope to continue to build on the positive trends in terms of membership growth and in person attendance. My goal is to be able to focus more attention in 2025 to evangelism and growth. But before we can do that, we need to have the right staff in place and the church to be running as effectively as possible.

Our youth group and confirmation crew focused on the work of preparing for a service trip in Costa Rica, where we served to repair structures in in the Children's Eternal Rain Forest and provided programming and materials for a local school in need. We planned, we laughed, we fundraised, we donated, we sang, we prayed, we worshipped, we bake cookies and made meals and collected clothing, met people where they were and loved them fully! Let us not forget that we also unloaded 15,000lbs of pumpkins – which raised revenue for Indigenous Farming Communities in New Mexico, supported our denominations efforts for disaster relief through Global H.O.P.E., and provided future funds for service projects and trips for our youth.

Our Confirmation class welcomed in 8 new members and served all year in worship and in church led activities and service days. Our Youth served on support boards, read scripture in worship, led discussions and games, small group activities, shared meals, and planned for a new year together and what a year it has been!

Church Council

In accordance with our WHCC By-laws, the Church Council is the principal governing body of the Church and has the authority between congregational meetings to establish and implement overall policies of the Church, coordinate activities and operations of the Church, and engage in long-range planning, among other activities. The Council also acts to convene ad-hoc committees and task forces to carry out special projects for the church when needed.

This year, the Council moved to a new schedule of bi-monthly meetings, meeting in March, May, July, September, November, December, and again in January. We continued our practice of meeting via Zoom, but it is our hope to move to hybrid meetings.

A Year of Transitions

Change is inevitable, as life and health circumstances change, but we as a congregation are becoming well practiced in the art of moving with and through change. As we are told in Ecclesiastes, "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven". This year has been full of transitions and changes in both staff and clergy. It has also been a year where we have fully emerged from the isolation of the Covid years. We have been able to celebrate, grieve, study, make music, and most importantly, worship together.

Clergy Transitions

In December of 2022, we said goodbye to our co-Interim Ministers, Rev. Dr. Jill Edens and Rev. Rick Edens, who led us capably during the transition and search period. On January 1, 2023, Rev. Jonathan Page began his ministry at the Hills Church as the settled Senior Minister, returning to the church community where he was baptized, confirmed and ordained. Jonathan's thought provoking sermons combined with his deep faith and enthusiasm for all things Congregational (especially meetings!) have brought a new level of energy to the Hills, and hopes for continued community engagement and growth.

We are very grateful for the work of the Transition and Search Teams that worked so diligently and with such faith and commitment on the Pastoral Search, and we looked forward to working with Jonathan to strengthen our community and our commitment to serving and loving God.

In September, Rev. Anne Marie Holloway announced that she had been called as the Sole Minister at Allin Congregational Church in Dedham, Massachusetts. Rev. Anne Marie has served the Hills Church for 5 years as Associate Minister for Youth and Families, carefully rebuilding our programs, and nurturing our youth through the pandemic with creativity, faith, and JOY. Her high energy, her exuberant and outgoing spirit helped us all to keep our community going when it was so difficult to be together. Although we knew we would miss her deeply, we rejoiced as she accepted God's call to serve at Allin Church, beginning the first of January 2024.

An Interim Search Team, comprised of Mimi D'Angelo, Jack Morgan, Barbara Farmer, Laurie Otten and Rev. Jonathan Page began work in October to find an Interim Minister who will work with both Rev. Jonathan and Rev. Judy to support the work of the church. We will welcome Rev. Katie Omberg to the Hills Church starting April 8, 2024.

In December, a Search Team for a Settled Associate Minister was approved by the Spiritual Care Support Board. Members of the Search Committee are: Rev. Jonathan Page, Lynette Banks, Kristin Der, Lori Janiuk, Clint Liebenberg, Steven Patrick, Anna Thomas, and Susan Walton. They have begun work to find a new settled Associate, with the hope that they will be successful by summer.

In October, Rev. Judy Swahnberg, Associate Minister, announced that the time has come for her to retire. Rev. Judy has a long association with the Hills Church, beginning in 1986 when she and husband Carl Novotny joined the church. After beginning seminary on September 11, 2001, Rev. Judy served as seminarian and was ordained at the Hills Church, eventually coming back to serve as Associate Minister in 2011. It is time now for her to spend more time with her growing family (she and Carl have just welcomed

their 10th grandchild). We are so grateful for the caring, compassionate pastoral care that Judy has given over the last thirteen or so years.

Rev. Judy will reduce her role to half time after the Annual Meeting, and will fully retire at the end of June 2024. This tiered approach will allow time for a smooth clergy transition. Together with Rev. Jonathan, the Deacons and a team of lay leaders will be implementing a plan to make sure that the needs of the congregation are met.

Staff Transitions

In June, at a star studded Gala, we celebrated Director of Music John Finney, and his long tenure at the Hills Church. After 39 years of leading the Chancel Choir and the music programs of the church, and providing inspiration and leadership from a well of deep faith and remarkable talent, John felt it was time to retire. He continued to support our worship through the summer, until our new Director of Music could begin. Meanwhile, a committee was established in coordination with the Spiritual Care Support Board to search for a new Director of Music. In August, Dr. Will Cooper was hired, and began work at the Hills Church. Will has quickly endeared himself to all with his gentle manner, his joyful improvisations on hymns and his own compositions. For Special Music Sunday, he challenged the Chancel Choir to learn and present an amazingly difficult work, Dixit Dominus, by G. F. Handel, a challenge the choir met with hard work and determination. In addition, he has established a Children's Choir which now meets Wednesdays, and was recently heard at our Christmas Concert, along with the Cherub Choir, the Hills Bells and the Chancel Choir. It is a welcome joy to hear our children's voices raised in the songs of our faith.

The creative, joyful and energetic Sally Tomasetti is now the Director of Children's Ministry, and her position has increased to ³/₄ time. Joe Brady, formerly facilities manager, left the Hills Church's employ to take a full time job elsewhere, but continues to be on call, remotely, to work with Administrator Andrea Bellarosa to monitor the HVAC systems, and John Dooley is now the sole employee in the Finance Office.

2023 Annual Meeting

Our January Annual Meeting was successfully held once again in the Hybrid format, thanks to the hard work of clergy, staff, and volunteers. Attendance continues to be strong, using the hybrid format. Reports of the various Boards and Ministry Teams were received, a slate of officers and Special Ministry Team Members were voted in, a budget for 2023 was adopted, and a Bylaw was adopted creating the office of Clerk Emeritus, with Rich Sweeting holding that office.

Financial Situation 2023 and looking forward

The year 2023 was predicted to be a challenging year both for stewardship and spending according to last year's Annual Report. And so it has been. But expenses have been controlled as much as possible, and Nursery School enrollment and tuition, along with continued grants from the Commonwealth for preschool all contributed to better than expected revenue growth. For the third year in a row, and the fifth year in the last ten, no draw was required from the endowment.

As detailed in the Stewards Report, 2024 is also expected to be challenging, both for stewardship and spending. Church Council and the Stewards Support Board will continue to carefully manage expenses, and have kept many line items at the same level as the 2023 budget, but the majority of our expenses are for human resources – our clergy and staff – and the maintenance, upkeep and insuring of our facility. Christian Service-related spending is an important part of our mission. It bears repeating that, thanks in part to a better than expected contribution from the Nursery School, as well as unbudgeted grants from the Commonwealth, no draw was needed from the endowment this past year. The 2024 budget does include a potential endowment draw, but the expectation is that it will be below the 4% target*.

We will continue to focus on supporting the work of our excellent clergy and staff, strengthening programs that nurture our faith, growing our membership and nurturing a new generation of givers, including leadership givers.

A plan for potential Parish House renovations was put on hold this past year, but the hope is that it will be taken up again soon. Plans are for limited renovations, particularly the rest rooms which will benefit all, bring us in compliance with inclusive access requirements, enhance our already wonderful Church School experience, and allow expansion of the Wellesley Nursery School in the Hills.

*Each year the Church intends to draw from the Endowment not more than 4% of the three year average of the total investment funds. The Church did not draw from the Endowment during the three years 2021 to 2023 and was able to restore some of the monies withdrawn earlier during the renovation campaign.

Leadership Retreat

In early March, we held an in-person Leadership Retreat, the first since March of 2020. Attendance and energy were high as we lifted up several questions for thought and discussion, and brain stormed ways to strengthen our church. It was good to be together!

New Initiatives

The Hills Church has a new Database, REALM, but it has taken some time to transfer over from our previous database. A REALM Launch team has been formed to work on ways to help members log-in, create profiles, and confidently use Realm. It is our hope that by the time of Annual Meeting, the launch will be well underway. With gratitude to Doug Eisenhart, Susie Alexander, Chris Stowell, P-O Davidsson, Jason Kranker and Rev. Jonathan Page.

The Stewards Support Board will support two new ministry teams:

Development Ministry Team, which will coordinate fund-raising efforts of the church, and Property Ministry Team, which will support and work with Church Administrator Andrea Bellarosa in identifying and facilitating property issues.

Thanks, and Acknowledgements

In March of 2023, we mourned the loss and celebrated the life of former Moderator Mary Hill Canavan. Mary was an inspiring leader as we moved into the new governance model, as well as being a deeply spiritual person, who shared her faith and love through service to the Church, and through the Meditation Group. I miss her encouragement, her wisdom and her beautiful and compassionate spirit in things earthly and spiritual.

In 2022, we lost Sarah Pedersen, at the time serving as Former Moderator. A group of her Wellesley College friends have provided the Hills Church with a lovely bench, placed on the front lawn, and dedicated in May "In Loving Memory" of Sarah, "a light in all our lives."

It has been a joy and a privilege to work with all the dedicated and talented members of the Church Council. I have especially appreciated the guidance and wisdom of Jack Morgan (Former Moderator), Steven Patrick (Rising Moderator), our wonderful and inspiring clergy and dedicated staff, the Senior Deacons, the Support Board Chairs, and the tremendous work of all those volunteers who give heart & energy to our church. I look forward to serving in 2024 as the Former Moderator and continuing to support Steven Patrick, who will become Moderator after the January 28, 2024 Annual Meeting, and Kristen Toffer, who will become Rising Moderator.

Communications Ministry Team

Personnel Committee

The Personnel Committee works with the Senior Minister, Office of the Moderator, church staff, support boards and other committees to define job responsibilities, recruit staff, and set competitive and equitable compensation levels for the church's clergy and staff. In addition, the Committee helps to establish parameters for job reviews and performance evaluations, seeks legal advice, when necessary, on employment law issues, provides a confidential and constructive forum for the discussion of issues relating to the effective functioning of our staff, and helps organize employee appreciation events.

One of the key responsibilities of the Committee is reviewing and incorporating competitive market data to ensure that compensation for all categories of Hills Church employees - both non-clergy and clergy – is competitive, fair, and equitable. The Committee is also responsible for ensuring that employee benefits offered to church staff members, e.g., health insurance, vacation days, are competitive and appropriate. In addition, the Committee is responsible for ensuring the church's policies comply with all applicable laws and regulations.

This year the Personnel Committee assisted with the hiring of the new Music Director, the Interim Associate Minister, and the realigning of some of the church staff. The committee also researched and worked on updating the employee handbook which is expected to be approved by the church council in early 2024. The committee also developed agreements with the choir soloists and worked with the Music Director on the compensation structure for the choir soloists to support the search for two new soloists.

Members of the Personnel Committee in 2023 were: Ruth Persson, Chair; members at large: Gintas Vildzius, Linda Thomas; from the moderators: Laurie Otten; from the senior deacon: Steve Groff; from Stewards: Alex Kolb; and the Senior Minister: Jonathan Page.

Participation and Involvement

Racial Justice

In 1848, the founding members of this congregation shared a commitment to the abolition of slavery in the United States, and a pledge to the abolitionist cause was a requirement of membership in the church. In continuation of our heritage, Church Council has called for the formation of a new Racial Justice Working Group within the church. The Racial Justice Working Group was formed in 2020 as an actionable and prayerful response by our faithful community to the murder of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor. All that we have done and continue to do is in support of our congregation's efforts toward the work of becoming an anti-racist church.

Love is at the heart of our ministry together at the Hills church. Without love, there is no justice. Jesus embodied what God's love truly looked like and we are called to do the same. Jesus summarizes the most important commands of the Christian faith which are to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your mind and with all your strength". The second is this; "Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these." It is in this mandate of Jesus, that the Racial Justice Working Group finds its focus and its mission.

The Racial Justice Working Group continues to initiate opportunities for discussion and education and serves to recommend practical steps for the church to continue our ministry of racial justice. As we look ahead, we have committed to the following strategic plan and the next steps we will take to live out our mission and vision.

As people of faith and followers of Jesus, filled with love, members of the Racial Justice Working Group seek to be builders of a just world for all.

Reopening Task Force

The Re-Opening Task Force has continued to monitor the COVID-19 public health data provided by the MA Department of Public Health (<u>https://www.mass.gov/info-details/covid-19-response-reporting</u>) and the levels of COVID-19 RNA in the wastewater in eastern MA as measured by the MWRA (<u>https://www.mwra.com/biobot/biobotdata.htm</u>). In addition, the Task Force has continued to track changes in the recommendations issued by the CDC and the Commonwealth.

In 2023 we were able to gather for worship and fellowship with no restrictions. We only issued possible Covid exposure notifications twice, early in the year. The Task Force has ceased issuing these notifications for several reasons. Although the level of COVID in the Boston Metro area has been rising gradually over the past several months, it remains relatively low. The incidence of serious morbidity and mortality has not been rising, however. This may be due to the high level of immune resistance to COVID in the population which has resulted from high rates of vaccination and/or previous infection.

In 2024, the Task Force will request that Church Council decommission the group. Members of the Task Force will continue to monitor the public health data, and review any new COVID-related health recommendations issued by the Commonwealth and the CDC. If changes in the situation warrant, Church Council or other concerned parties in the congregation or staff could request the revival of the Task Force on an ad hoc basis.

Care Team Ministry



Working closely with the ministers and the Spiritual Care Support Board (Board of Deacons), the Care Team continues to be a key resource in the life of the Hills Church, enhancing pastoral care within the congregation, and providing connection, encouragement and tangible support to individuals and families. The Care Teams blesses the Hills congregation with cards and calls, meals, and visits.

During this past year, dozens of church members participated in Care Team ministry. Saranel McGuirk continued as coordinator of care. Becky Lockwood, Saranel McGuirk, Mary Ellen Dinwoodey and Lori Januik, all former members of the Board of Deacons with broad knowledge of the congregation, continued as Care Team Captains. Their leadership is a blessing. Care Team Coordinator Saranel McGuirk also reaches out to with a special

personal outreach ministry of notes and cards.

One of the graces of this ministry is that there are no monthly meetings. Instead, the ministry works through a web of interconnection among pastors, team leaders, care teams and deacons. Each week the pastors meet to review the known pastoral needs and suggest individuals for follow up pastoral care. (Alas, not all the family and individual needs of the parish are made known to the clergy team.)

The four Hills Church Care Teams rotate, serving approximately once per month. Using this model, any member of the week's scheduled team, as well as members of the Board of Deacons, may respond to the suggestions, depending on their inclination and availability. Care Team is structured to allow individuals to participate as the Spirit moves, more on some weeks than others. Members may also bow out of active participation at any time with our thanks.

The Care Teams are opportunities to reflect theologically about where God is being glimpsed in our midst, in our shared joys and sorrows. This aspect of shared ministry is an underlying grace. The Hills Church congregation continues to commit to this ministry and express gratitude for the Care Team. Director of Music Search Committee

Following the work of the Music Discernment Committee, which resulted in a report shared with the congregation in late 2022, a Search Committee was formed in early 2023 with the task of identifying a successor to John Finney, who was retiring in the Summer of 2023, after 39 years as Director of Music. The Committee looked for a very skilled and experienced organist, musician, choir director, and conductor, as well as a person of faith and with high character recommendations.

After an extensive search, we unanimously recommended to Reverend Jonathan Page that we hire Dr. William Cooper as our new Director of Music. After viewing video performances, evaluating resumes and reading recommendations, Dr. Cooper stood out in a field of 20 candidates from all over the country. His Zoom interview, his audition with the choir, and subsequent interviews reinforced our impression that he is a good fit for the Hills Church. We are thrilled that he accepted the position and began overseeing our music program, directing the choir, playing the organ, and helping to establish a youth/children's choir on August 22.

Interim Search Committee

On September 17, Rev. Anne Marie Holloway informed the congregation that she had accepted the call to serve as the next Minister of the Allin Congregational Church in Dedham. Along with the whole congregation, we celebrate Anne Marie's pursuit of her call from God, and we know the Allin Church will be lucky indeed to have her as their new minister.

At the Deacons meeting on October 3, an Interim Minister Search Committee was formed that included Mimi D'Angelo, Barbara Farmer, Jack Morgan, Laurie Otten, and Rev. Jonathan Page. That committee created an Interim Minister Profile and worked with the Southern New England Conference to advertise the position. After reviewing applications, we interviewed two different candidates and offered the position to Rev. Katie Omberg, who is now serving at the Interim Minister at the Congregational Church in Melrose Highlands. We were impressed with Katie's enthusiasm, her intelligence, and her experience and we feel she is the right fit to serve as the Interim Minister. Judy Swahnberg also interviewed Katie and affirmed the discernment of the committee.

Since Katie is finishing up her important work in Melrose, she will not be able to begin her interim work until April 8, 2024. In the meantime, Jonathan and Judy will cover the pastoral and ministerial duties of the church. Katie will serve until we find a replacement for Anne Marie and will then continue working at the Hills Church as we discern what to do to fill Judy's role after she retires in June 2024. It is the committee's recommendation that a Discernment Committee be established in April 2024 to help us decide what structure would be best for the Hills Church at this time. There will be plenty of opportunity for congregational input in that process.

The Interim Search Committee also took on the role of revising the Church Profile from the last ministerial search. We are grateful for the hard work of the previous Transition Committee, which has made our task immeasurably easier. The revised Profile will be reviewed by the Settled Search Committee and others before it is posted to the UCC job site in late January.

While it is always hard to say goodbye to such gifted clergy as Anne Marie and Judy, we are hopeful that the congregation will find the right candidates to lead us into the future.

Membership Ministry Team

In the past, membership was overseen by several people on the Spiritual Care Support Board (SCSB) working with the clergy. In 2021, Church Council created the Membership Ministry Team (MMT) which is supported by the SCSB, by combining members of that Board who are assigned to this team, with additional members of the clergy and the congregation. In 2023 the members of this ministry team included: P.-O. Davidsson*, Becky Epstein, Ted Garland*, Anne-Marie Holloway (co-chair), Sara Johnson*, Jonathan Page, Christopher Stowell (co-chair) and Myralee Wilson. (* From the SCSB.) We were substantially supported this year by Judy Swahnberg, Andrea Bellarosa and Noreen Young. The MMT's charges consist of:

- Outreach inviting the community to our church and congregation
- On-boarding of new members engaging visitors and prospective members, and transitioning them to membership
- Development of current members enriching the lives of current members and helping them to find meaningful roles in our church community

In 2023 we carried out a number of projects addressing these charges including:

- At three Joining Sundays this year (1/8, 4/30 and 10/15) we welcomed 18 new adult members and their 16 minor children.
- We continued to track visitors and prospective members in a database we created last year. This helped us to reach out to this group of people in an organized manner.
- However, we have also developed a more comprehensive, several step process for moving visitors along to membership which involves multiple contacts with them by clergy and members of the MT. This process has been translated into a 'Pathway' in Realm (the new church operating software) which we think will be fully functional early in 2024. To that end:
- all of the MMT members have been invited to establish their accounts;
- we have updated the Realm database to include the prospective members we have been tracking;
- we are planning to in-service MMT members on using the Realm Pathway to track prospective members in January.
- We revived the Ambassador Program whereby prospective and new members are paired with current members of the congregation for a year to give the former a church 'friend' who can help them meet people and find their niche in our community.
- We re-organized the new member information sessions and Joining Sunday itself, adding a new member breakfast and gift bags with books/flyers with information about the church, the cookbook, notecards, etc.
- Ted Garland has been photographing new and current members of the congregation for the directory, and uploading them into Realm.
- We completed a second review of the membership rolls in ACS (now Realm). Recall that we had extensively combed and edited the rolls last year resulting in a list of approximately 660 names.
- Along with the clergy, staff and Noreen Young, we helped plan publicity for this year's special events. We also did a mailing of the Easter events card to recent real estate purchasers in Wellesley and the adjacent zip codes.
- We arranged for an article about Jonathan Page's arrival to appear in the Wellesley/Weston magazine.
- We organized the recognition of long-term members at the Annual Meeting last year and will do so for this year.

In February we will review and update our list of projects and prioritize them for 2024. First on the list will be completing the implementation of the Pathways.

Director of Music Report John Finney, retired (January through July 2023)

Having announced in March 2022 that I would be retiring in the summer of 2023 (after 39 years as Director of Music for the Hills Church), I knew that 2023 would include not only significant accomplishments, but also numerous transitions and exciting changes.

Here are some of the events from the first half of 2023 at the Hills Church that I would like to highlight:

- In January 2023, I was thrilled, along with the Staff and Congregation of the Hills Church, to welcome Rev. Jonathan Page as our new Senior Minister! It was a supreme joy for me to work with him during my last year at the Hills Church.
- The season of Lent was enhanced by a series of Wednesday evening services in Wallace Chapel, featuring music from the Taizé tradition. I am grateful to Lucy O'Mara, Barbara Farmer, Laurie Otten, and others for volunteering to lead the music for these deeply moving services.
- Our Chancel Choir and soloists were joined by a chamber orchestra to present Ola Gjeilo's sublime and evocative "Sunrise Mass" as our Special Music on Sunday morning, March 19. This was an event of great significance, as it was the culmination of many months of rehearsals which began in January 2020. We had originally planned to present the "Sunrise Mass" in March 2020, but that presentation had to be postponed due to the onset of the pandemic. What a thrill it was for all of us to finally present this beautiful music to the Hills Church in 2023!
- Easter 2023 was a glorious event! Our Chancel Choir and Hills Bells were once again joined by the Gainsborough Brass Ensemble in presenting splendid music. One of our anthems was Joel Martinson's "Alleluia! Heart and Voice to Heaven Raise," which had been commissioned by the Hills Church in 2009 in honor of my 25th anniversary as Director of Music.
- I was honored to work with our Chancel Choir and guest soloist Shelby Condray to provide the music for the magnificent Service of Installation for Rev. Jonathan Page as Senior Minister on April 23.
- The weekend of June 17-18 will forever be one of the most memorable weekends of my entire life, as the Hills Church created an extravagant series of events in honor of my retirement after 39 years as Director of Music. A gala banquet on Saturday evening (orchestrated by Marbo Hansen and a host of volunteers) included sumptuous decor and food, as well as heartfelt tributes and delightful musical offerings. The service on Sunday morning June 18 included the world-premieres of two musical compositions that had been commissioned in my honor: "Noël," by Fred Gramann (largely based on Daquin's "Noël X," my traditional Christmas Eve postlude), played brilliantly by The Hills Bells, conducted by Martha Stowell; and "I Lift Up My Eyes to the Hills" by Joel Martinson, sung exquisitely by our Chancel Choir and accompanied on the organ by my spouse and former Hills Church Director of Music James David Christie (who graciously stepped in to play for our services during the six weeks when I was recovering from surgeries for two detached retinas and couldn't see well enough to play). Following Rev. Jonathan Page's eloquent sermon on the power of music, I was called forth for a special blessing and laying-on of hands by our three ministers (Rev. Page, Rev. Judy Swahnberg, and Rev. Anne Marie Holloway). Later in the service, Laurie Otten (Church Moderator and longtime Soprano Soloist) presented me with extraordinarily generous gifts from the Hills Church.

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I will never be able to adequately thank Barbara Farmer for all she did in June and July 2023, when it became apparent to me that I needed an immense amount of help because my vision was still impaired as I continued to recover from the surgeries (in May 2023) for two detached retinas. Both Shannon and Garrett will be leaving the Hills Church at the end of 2023; oh, how they will be missed!

A special word of thanks to Emily Gauthier for her excellent work in bringing the joy of singing to our children each Sunday!

I extend my heartfelt thanks and boundless admiration to Martha Stowell for her volunteer work as Founder and Director of The Hills Bells. Martha continues to seek out beautiful and engaging music for bells, and to inspire and lead the members of The Hills Bells in ways that foster deep connection and commitment.

And I am deeply grateful to all the members of the Chancel Choir and of The Hills Bells, who volunteer their time so graciously to attend rehearsals and services each week, and who donate their musical talent so generously to enhance our worship services.

It has been an immense joy to work with our phenomenal Hills Church Staff, including Office Administrator Andrea Bellarosa, Financial Officer John Dooley, and Children's Ministry Director Sally Tomasetti. And I will forever be grateful to our ministers Rev. Jonathan Page, Rev. Judy Swahnberg, and Rev. Anne Marie Holloway for being not only supportive and compassionate colleagues, but also inspiring spiritual leaders.

The Music Discernment Committee had been created in 2022, charged with examining the role of music at the Hills Church, surveying the congregation for their input, and making recommendations on the next steps toward finding a new Director of Music. Director of Music Report Will Cooper (August through December 2023)

It was a great joy for me to join the Hills Church as Music Director in August. I felt called by God to serve here, and am blessed to lead music at such a warm and welcoming church that has such a great tradition of music in worship. I am grateful to the members of the search committee for their support, and to John Finney, who has been tremendously helpful during the transition. Here are some highlights from the second half of 2023:

- Sunday, August 27 marked my first Sunday at the Hills Church.
- On Sunday, September 3, we presented Bach's Cantata BWV 82, Ich habe genug in its entirety with bass soloist Garrett Murphy and oboist Jennifer Slowik.
- On October 1, we were joined by violinist, Jiyu Oh, who performed two of my chorale preludes and a new arrangement of Great Is Thy Faithfulness with bass soloist Garrett Murphy.
- On October 15, we were joined by violist Joan Ellersick, who performed three of my chorale
 preludes and played on the hymns as well.
- On November 5, the Hills Bells played a festive prelude. We were also joined by three students from the Walnut Hill School, Jessica Kartawidjaja, Daniel Ma and James Palmer, who accompanied the Chancel Choir on the Introit from Faure's Requiem. Sara Johnson offered a beautiful flute solo during Communion that Sunday.
- In early November, we relaunched our children's choirs at the Hills Church. The Cherub Choir (Pre-K through 2nd grade) is led by Emily Gauthier, and meets after church on Sundays. The Children's Choir (3rd grade through 8th grade) is led by myself, and meets Wednesday afternoons from 4:30-5:15.
- On December 3, the Hills Bells kicked off Advent with Gramann's Ring Change Prelude on Divinum Mysterium.
- On December 10, the Chancel Choir was joined by a period orchestra to present Händel's Dixit Dominus. This was the culmination of months of hard work. We started rehearsing in late September, and added additional sectional rehearsals. Dixit Dominus is considered to be Händel's most challenging choral work, and I am so proud of the Chancel Choir and our soloists who tackled the challenge, and did an extraordinary job. It was also a bittersweet day, as we honored our wonderful longtime soloists Shannon Lebrón and Garrett Murphy, both of whom are stepping down from their positions at the end of 2023.
- On December 13, we presented our annual Seniors Christmas Concert. It was a joy to have both Laurie Otten and Michael Calmes singing for this special event, which was followed by a lovely luncheon.
- December 16 was the date of our annual Christmas Concert, which featured the Hills Bells, the Chancel Choir, our soloists, as well as the Children's Choir and Cherub Choir. It was wonderful to hear all of our musical ensembles on the same program.
- On December 17, we celebrated the Third Sunday of Advent with brass and bells, while we also said farewell and honored our beloved Rev. Anne Marie Holloway. We sang two special arrangements of Christmas carols with the Chancel Choir, brass, the Hills Bells and the congregation.
- On Christmas Eve, the combined Children's Choirs sang at the 3:30 pageant. The Chancel Choir sang at the 6pm and 10pm services. We heard beautiful solos by each of our soloists, Laurie Stewart Otten, Shannon Lebrón, Michael Calmés and Garrett Murphy. We were also joined by hornist Daniel Ma for the service.
- A central part of my ministry as a church musician is the composition of new music. This fall, I composed instrumental hymn arrangements for All Saints Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent, and Christmas Eve, several descants, an orchestral prelude for period instruments on Es ist ein Ros entsprungen, and a Christmas Brass Medley written in honor of Rev. Anne Marie Holloway.

I am so thankful to our soloists, Laurie Stewart Otten, Shannon Lebrón, Michael Calmés and Garrett Murphy, who provided so many beautiful musical offerings and faithfully led their sections of the choir. Shannon and

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Garrett will be sorely missed, but they have each assured me they will be back to sing with us from time to time. I also would like to thank Stephen Lebrón, who regularly served as our substitute bass soloist. I am deeply grateful to Emily Gauthier, who did wonderful work with the Cherub Choir this fall. I also wish to thank Martha Stowell and the Hills Bells for the beauty and artistry they provide at so many of our services. I appreciate each and every member of the Chancel Choir, for their hard work, wonderful singing and dedication to the group. I am thankful to all the members of the Children's and Cherub Choirs, and their parents, who committed to making joyful music together this fall. I would especially like to thank Barbara Farmer for her work in our choir room, as well as volunteering her time to sit in on numerous Children's Choir rehearsals. I am grateful to Harriet Dishman, who helps to organize our choir robes. Ushering Report

It is with gratitude to those who previously led the Ushering Ministry Team and to those experienced ushers who show up Sunday after Sunday that Ruth Persson and Anna Spencer Armstrong took on organizing and recruiting Ushers for this new year.

The primary duty of the ushers is to welcome people into church each Sunday. We do this by providing orders of worships, orienting people to the worship service and the building, and by simply greeting people as they come in. We let families know that little wigglers are welcome in the service and that there is an option for drop -off child care on the third floor. For families uncomfortable dropping their kids off, there is comfortable space for them in the Board Room where the service can still be heard. We ensure that hearing aids get passed out and that walkers get stored safely away at the beginning of the service and are returned to their owners at the end. Finally, we ensure that the sanctuary is reset at the end of the service so it is ready to receive people again the next week.

The secondary duties include managing the collection of offerings, count attendance and collecting the fellowship pads.

Throughout last winter and spring, the Ushering Ministry Team provided 2-4 people per Sunday. For higher volume Sundays such as Easter the team recruited up to 6 ushers. During the summer months the Deacons graciously completed all ushering duties. We thank the Deacons for this service and for their continuing support throughout the rest of the year!

This fall we found that larger numbers of people joining each Sunday has required a minimum of 4 people to efficiently collect the offering. In anticipation of the time when 6 or even 8 might suddenly be required, we have several ushers who have volunteered to be called upon in the midst of a service should it be decided that more people would be needed to complete the collection in the allotted time.

So far this fall we have had 24 different people sign up for ushering including several first-time ushers. Experienced ushers offer day-of training to new ushers to make volunteering as easy and stressless as possible. We continue to recruit new volunteers and welcome all to this vital ministry.

Welcoming Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Task Force

WHCC voted on June 5, 2011, to accept the following ONA Welcome Statement:

The Hills Church affirms God's embrace of every individual and strives to follow Jesus' commandment to love one another. Enriched by diversity, we welcome people of every sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, ethnicity, culture, and family configuration to share in the full life and ministry of the church.

Our current Task Force was formed by the Deacons in 2021 to find expressions of welcome to the LGBTQ+ community as we celebrated a decade of being an Open and Affirming church (ONA).

The original purpose of the ONA Task Force, giving a visual expression to what the WHCC Congregation ratified over a decade ago, has been met.

- We approved purchase by the Spiritual Care Support Board (Deacons) of four multicolored Adirondack-style chairs.
- We approved the display of a banner on the exterior wall of Wallace Chapel and flags along the front walkway.
- We have discovered upon close inspection that the sign on the front lawn is rotting, in disrepair, and needs replacement. If the sign on the front lawn is replaced, the Task Force recommends that a rainbow strip is added as a sign of welcome to the LGBTQ+ community.

With these things accomplished, the ONA group is now working toward continuing the discussion of living out our commitment to this community by determining the role of the Hills Church in the ever-evolving LGBTQ discussion.

Values that guide us:

Provide safety for the LGBTQ community

- Create a space where people are all welcome; No judging: for it not to be a "big deal" who we are; we are all Christians
- Understand that the urgency of this work is clear. We have children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and friends who are suffering.
- Love is at the center of our ministry to share the joy of church life with all.

Mission:

The Wellesley Hills Congregational Church (the "Hills Church") will seek to ensure a safe and engaging environment for all LGBTQ+ individuals, inclusive of gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, and gender-nonconforming people of all ages. The Hills Church strives to promote awareness of the Hills Church's open and affirming (ONA) policy by creating positive impact within its sanctuary and for the entire community through education, advocacy, discussion, and any other appropriate means. Women's Ministry

Last year we reported that we had paused activities to discern what "Women's Ministry" would look like in the future. In the midst of our pause, Katie McCabe offered to chair a Rummage Sale, so we were delighted to be able to host the sale once again last spring.

Katie McCabe, Donna McCabe and Monica Garfield went to work and pulled together a Rummage Sale that was successful not only in the amount raised, but in offering an opportunity for church members to work together and to reconnect after the years of isolation. The sale raised about \$8000 which will be disbursed to outreach programs that provide services to women and children. Past years, recipients have included such charities as Honduras Hope and Help Kids India.

A new group began in October, Needlework for All, led by Bev St. Clair. Their mission: to welcome all interested in needlework of all types, at any skill level. The group aims to teach and learn together, through knitting, crocheting, and all sorts of handwork for all sorts of projects: personal, for church endeavors, and for other organizations. The group meets monthly in person – see their announcements in Events in the Hills!

Knitters have continued to provide prayer shawls for members who need care and comfort, baptismal blankets for babies newly baptized, and graduation scarves for high school graduates. This year we were able to gift a graduation scarf to Rev. Anne Marie Holloway to remind her of the ongoing love of the Hills Church as she steps into her new role at the Allin Congregational Church in Dedham.

As important as the funds raised and the shawls and blankets knitted has been the fellowship enjoyed as we worked and served together. We look forward to providing more opportunities for women to work, pray, and laugh together!






Operating Results

Our 2023 operating results and the proposed 2024 budget are among the documents in the financial hand-out that is being circulated as a part of the 2024 Annual Meeting. As in prior years, the draft 2023 internal financial statements are available in electronic form from our church administrator.

In 2023, our combined annual revenues were \$1.47 million versus a budget of \$1.33 million. Annual stewardship receipts and gifts for 2023 of \$852 thousand were \$40 thousand unfavorable to budget while Nursery School revenues of \$910 thousand exceeded budget expectations by \$92 thousand as student enrollment was at capacity. Overall, the Nursery School contributed income, net of expenses of \$417 thousand in 2023 exceeding budget expectations by approximately \$50 thousand, augmented by unplanned grants from the State of Massachusetts as well as better than expected enrollment. In addition to the above, the church received other income of \$169 thousand comprised primarily of monies received from the Christmas and Easter offerings, net proceeds from the Pumpkin Patch, as well as gifts received at the installation service of our new Senior Minister.



Total expenses for 2023 of \$1.62 million were slightly unfavorable to budget by \$68 thousand due primarily to higher Office and Property expenses which included costs related to technology upgrades as well as a number of repairs to the property which were incurred throughout the year. In addition, we saw higher than planned Youth expenses related to unplanned costs supporting the youth service trip in May of 2023. These increases were partially offset by lower Human Resource costs due to the departure of our finance associate and our part-time sexton during the middle of the year as well as the timing of Christian Service Support Board spending.




Investment Results

Our principal investment account at Charles Schwab, which is professionally managed by Birch Hill, had total account and equity investment returns of approximately 13.8% and 20.6% respectively while the Standard & Poors 500 Index returned 26.3% and the Dow Jones Industrial Average returned 16.2%. This resulted in an endowment balance at the end of 2023 of \$4.72 million as compared to a balance of \$3.97 million in the same period a year ago.

Our current investment return target remains a real return (inflation adjusted) of at least 4% annual average total growth. In parallel, our spending policy contemplates that annually we will use 4% of the annual three-year year-end average balance for operations. We made no draws on the endowment in 2021, 2022 or 2023.

2024 Budget



Some parts of the endowment are restricted and are most often targeting particular uses, either by the donors or by the pertinent church board. For example, in 2023, we once again expect to draw amounts from the J. David and Virginia Wimberly Fund for Music Ministry to help defray the annual compensation costs for our Director of Music and other music related expenses. The spending from these temporarily restricted funds is consistent with prior years and are unrelated to the planned endowment draw previously mentioned. Consistent with past practice, we wish to maintain and hopefully grow the endowment to support the Church's annual operations on a continuing basis.

Total expenses in 2024 are expected to generally be in-line with 2023 spending, driven by decreases in Human Resource costs due to the future construct of the clergy and related compensation as well as a decrease in Youth related expenses, there being no service trip planned for 2024. Partially offsetting these decreases are additional Property expenses related to anticipated repairs and minor increases from various service providers as well as an expectation that Christian Service Support Board spending will return to historical levels.

As a result of all of these factors, we once again expect to have a challenging but manageable operating deficit in 2024.

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The 2024 Budget plans for total revenues of \$1.39 million with a Nursery School occupancy rate to once again be at or very near capacity. At the end of December, Stewardship pledges for 2023 were approximately \$770 thousand, ahead of last year and pledge units were up just under 10%. Efforts to increase stewardship are on-going. Should it be needed, the budgeted draw from our endowment for Church operations will be approximately \$161 thousand in 2024.

Formation of a Development Ministry Team

Acting on recommendations of the Resource Requirement Committee which assessed the need for increased financial support for the Church, a Development Ministry Team was formed this summer. The Team is charged with coordinating and advising all fundraising efforts of the Hills Church including the annual stewardship campaign, future capital campaigns, and the establishment of the 1847 Legacy Circle. The latter will encourage legacy contributions to the Church as well as provide recognition for our members who have included the Church in their estate plans. The Team will also seek ways to re-activate members who have made annual pledges but no longer pledge. Moreover, the Team will develop and implement strategies to raise major gifts inspired by meaningful events in the life of our Church and/or with particular spiritual significance to individuals.

Members of the Development Ministry Team are Wendy Baker, Becky Epstein, David Ingram, Bob Minetti, Jonathan Page, Steven Patrick, Susan Walton, and Andy Wilson.

Finally, I want to thank our Treasurer, Nancy Simons, Assistant Treasurer, Nana Poku, as well as all of the members of the Stewards Support Board, including Jeff Dodge, Caitlin Baron, Alex Kolb, Susan Loveland, Rich Howe, Al Persson, Phil Laughlin and Garrett Murphy. It is a pleasure to work with such a talented and committed group.

Livestream Ministry and the Hills Church

Since July 2021, the church services have been coming live to your living rooms, your vacation spots, your phones, and all over the world. Over 200 videos have now been produced and are available on Youtube! And you can watch the replay any time, anywhere, and at your own convenience. This is the Hills Church Livestream.

Our Goals

Our goal with the livestream has been multi-fold:

- 1. Enable members and friends who cannot always make it to church for health reasons or travel or other conflicts the opportunity to keep up with the Hills Church community.
- 2. Provide people searching for a local church a chance to experience our community and hopefully decide to come visit us.
- 3. For special events, like funerals, weddings, or special music services, provide a way for people who cannot attend a chance to see the event, and it can become a cherished remembrance that can be replayed.

Provide a new way to reach out to others outside our direct community with messages of hope, love, faith, joy, and inclusion.

Success Stories

Some stories we have heard from our viewers have been very meaningful. One member who spends winters in the south introduced her sister to our church through livestream, and her sister is now watching our livestream regularly. Another member often visits his mother in elderly housing on Sundays, and they watch the service together. Others who have conflicts with kid sports and other activities have been grateful to have a way to watch the service later on in the day. Another was out of the country when a friend passed away, and was very grateful to be able to watch the memorial service on the livestream. And others have joined the church after first viewing the church on livestream.

We typically have 20-45 households tuned in live during the service, and 100-150 or more that tune into the service during the following week. Additionally, our minister sermons have their own playlist grouping, and they have gotten many additional views on their own. We also now have 300+ subscribers to our Youtube channel, a major milestone in Youtube participation which gives us more presence on the Youtube site.



Livestream Ministry and the Hills Church

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Getting Better all the Time

Over time, our livestream group has been perfecting their techniques to present a quality video of each service and event. We still have occasional issues and we can't go back or cover up mistakes in presentation of a livestream, but we have been able to reliably produce a livestream every Sunday (except one or two when the Internet connection failed). We are also grateful for criticisms, or suggestions for improvement. For example, we now include "Upcoming Events" in the lead-in as a result of several viewer suggestions.

Over the next year we will be reviewing our sound system to replace some aging technology. We will be fixing a problem we have with network isolation, and possibly bring some real-time video to more locations in the church. And we hope to provide easier mechanisms for people to search for music and sermons through our livestream collection.

You can Participate!

One of our major goals has always been to simplify the process of recording a service, so that it can be done by a single person with a minimal amount of training. So if you would like to help out, we are happy to let you learn!

Most important is a desire to learn video technology and to recognize that through livestream God has given us a means of supporting our church community even when they cannot be here in person.

Faith Formation Support Board (FFSB)

The Faith Formation Support Board (FFSB) oversees and nurtures the deepening and strengthening of faith for children, youth, and adults through a range of spiritual experiences and practices, activities, and traditional Christian education, both within the congregation and extending outward to our local neighbors and the world.

The Board met monthly this year, primarily by Zoom, though the most recent meeting was in person in the Chapel, sharing a potluck meal. At the beginning of the year Jonathan shared his vision of small group ministries which had been instrumental in creating community at his church in Houston. He recommended a book named *Activate* by Nelson Searcy which was distributed and discussed by the board during the next several meetings. As an initial step at creating small groups, Summer Suppers were organized as a way of keeping parishioners in touch over the summer. They were well received and the last one, hosted by Jonathan at the parsonage, attracted over 100 people.

Over the summer a series of small group offerings for the fall were developed. The leaders for the groups included, members of the church, clergy, and staff. A brochure was created, and members of the congregation were invited to sign up in September with most groups meeting during October and November. The program was very well received.

African Indian Alliance: A Siddi Partnership, Inc.



The African Indian Alliance was formed to support Siddis (African Indians) to realize their aspirations for, access to, and preparation for education and the improvement of their social and material circumstances. We continue to be committed to our mission of helping Siddi and non-Siddi children and communities in rural villages of Karnataka, India. Our efforts are focused on creating educational opportunities, as well as supporting students financially to aid with school fees and necessary materials and items needed for their education.

Reverend Dr. Pashington Obeng continues to serve his valuable role as Board President. The board is currently composed of Katie McCabe (Chair), Kelly Ford (Clerk), David Otten (Treasurer), Stephen Kofi Obeng, Nana Poku, Fiona Jamal Almeida, and Jessica Banks Gallo.

We continue to have a strong partnership with the Sisters of the Holy Cross. The Sisters stationed in Mainalli changed in this year and Fiona was able to travel there in the summer to help with the transition and explanation of the AIA partnership. The Sisters were able to identify many students aged primary to college levels in need of financial assistance for educational fees and materials and AIA supported them. AIA continues to support seven after school tuition centers in various languages and villages. These centers have a teacher supporting students with homework and test studying, and provides them a space to focus on their studies and give value to education.

We received a thank you note from a student Jareena who we have been supporting for years and was able to complete her studies to become a teacher.

In March 2023 we presented a mission moment and held an educational presentation for the church community about the Siddi population and our outreach within the communities and with educational scholarships.

Our goals in 2024 are to continue to support the tuition centers and individual student needs. We also hope to work with the Sisters in Mainalli to begin the work of renovating the girls living hostel in Mainalli to give them more space that is healthier and conducive to young womens growth physically and educationally. We will work on streamlining our scholarship application and policies and procedures for our board and partnerships on the ground in India. We still hope to grow and advance our board, complete a new website, and educate our community here in the U.S on ways to support our partners in the Siddi community.

We remain grateful to the Hills Church Christian Service Support Board and the members of the Wellesley Hills Congregational Church for their ongoing support and funding that make our mission programs possible.

Christmas Gifts Ministry



For almost 30 years our church has shopped for Christmas gifts for low-income families from Waltham. It is an annual tradition that church members look forward to every year. Clinicians from Thom Charles River Early Intervention submit names and wish lists from families. Church members sign-up to shop for individuals or entire families on SignUpGenius. They deliver the wrapped presents to the church where the clinicians pick them up to deliver to their families.

Four young people from the church volunteered on Saturday to help unload presents from the cars. A big thank you to Henry, Calliope, Cooper, & Simon! Sunday School children made Christmas cards to share with the families.

We had a very big list this year! It took the efforts of almost 100 people (members, friends and family, and El clinicians) to make sure that all 338 people on our list (91 families) received presents. 77 people shopped. 22 people donated money (\$6300) some of which was used to purchase gift cards for adults. The rest will be used throughout the year to respond to urgent needs (primarily food and diapers).

Church members tell me that it is a joy to shop for these families who have so little, and that it's a blessing to do it. They shop with their children to teach them the joy of giving and caring for others. A parent shared with me that her teenage daughter crocheted a gift to go with the requested 'Learn to Crochet' kit. People who are unable to shop donate money. It's all such an amazing outpouring of love and caring!

Because of the need to maintain confidentiality, the shoppers never get to meet the families for whom they so carefully and thoughtfully shop. But the clinicians know what a difference it makes for these families. A box of diapers frees up money for food. A winter coat and boots keep children warm for their walk to school. Toys provide an opportunity for fun and learning. But it's more than that. As one grateful family wrote in a thank you note "It's made such a difference to know that, out there, there are people who care....and even though they don't have halos, their hearts show they are angels! Your gift lifted my spirits and helped my girls feel loved. Blessings to you!"

A huge thank you to everyone who participated in this ministry!

2023 Annual Report for Family Promise Metrowest (FPM)

Background Information - The Wellesley Hills Congregational Church voted in 2008 to join FPM. Family Promise is a national program that provides temporary shelter, meals and support for homeless families through weeklong stays in houses of worship all over the country. Our network, Family Promise Metrowest, is one of 200 affiliates nationwide that have served over 700,000 guests since inception. Family Promise operates other programs out of the Natick Day Center; transitional housing, independent housing, and rent assistance to avoid eviction.

"Our mission is to transform the lives of families with children that are facing homelessness by mobilizing a diverse community to provide shelter, education, and comprehensive support. We serve low- and moderate-income families with at least one child under the age of 18 who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. Our families are Massachusetts residents, with priority given to families from the Metro west region. We welcome all genders and family compositions as long as all adults were part of the nuclear family and living together when the family became homeless."

FPM consists of 19 host congregations and 32 support congregations. WHCC is one of the host congregations.

In mid-2022, the newly renovated Day center, welcomed families into their temporary and static shelter site. Located at 6 Mulligan Street in Natick, the building now houses several offices, three bathrooms with showers for the guests, a large kitchen, meeting rooms, living area, and finished basement with a playroom and storage lockers. The Center serves as a home and home base, where guest families spend their non-working hours, receive counseling, participate in job training classes, shower, and do laundry.

Host and Support congregations now provide support with three primary roles at the shelter in Natick: Grocery Shoppers, Dinner Chefs and Dinner Hosts, described below. More volunteer roles are expected to be added as this new way of hosting evolves and it becomes clear what else might be needed.

Dinner Chefs: Volunteer chefs will prepare and deliver four dinners per week on a set weekly schedule. On alternate nights, families will eat leftovers or prepare their own meals. Congregational coordinators will consult with chefs to ensure no meal repetitions. (4 roles/week, each can be shared by two chefs.)

Dinner Hosts: On nights when dinner is provided by a congregation, dinner hosts will be present from 6-8pm to set up for dinner, share a meal and companionship with our families, and clean up afterward. Post-dinner, hosts can be available to offer support to parents or children (such as homework help, job search, or other needs expressed by a family). (Minimum 4-8 roles per week.)

Grocery Shoppers: Volunteers shop for and donate supplies that we distribute to families across all our programs, including breakfast/lunch items for shelter families and non-perishable pantry items for families in LIFE/SAIL programs. Grocery donations for shelter families will focus on supplying items that the families in all of the Programs need.

Volunteers from the congregations work together to meet this commitment, enabling each to contribute according to their abilities and capacity, while also developing valuable relationships that will strengthen our community. WHCC weeks to host in 2024 include: April 1-4, July 22-25 and Dec 9-12.

Over the years, FPM has grown from being a shelter to a comprehensive program addressing the needs of the families we serve. These additional programs allow FPM to support more families while addressing a gap in services.

- The SAIL program is a transitional living program to assist families after moving out of shelter. Case Management and subsidies are provided for one year following the move to ensure sustainability.
- The "Steps to Success" program focuses on comprehensive employment support and education. This
 program provides the means for families to maximize their earning potential while in shelter and
 transitional living.
- The LIFE program is a homelessness prevention program that supports families who are at risk of eviction but not yet homeless. Families may get one time help with a months rent, which is sometimes all they need to avoid homelessness.

2023 Highlights: Provided volunteers and support for two host weeks, including Thanksgiving week.

2024 Goals include:

Recruit another coordinator for WHCC Educate our congregation on the expanded FPM offerings and volunteer opportunities Recruit new volunteers from WHCC and Temple Beth Elohim Continue to incorporate FPM High School Clubs and NCL in our volunteer outreach efforts

Green Team

The purpose of the Green Team is to engage congregation members to understand and act upon environmental issues. The Southern New England United Church of Christ Green Congregation Challenge is a step-by-step approach that takes small, but consequential, steps towards protecting God's creation. The GCC has 4 levels to help congregants grow in our awareness and action. Each level has 5 categories: Educate; Organize; Reduce, Reuse, Rethink; Connect and Advocate.

The Green Team seeks to fulfill its mission by working through the 4 levels of the GCC and completing as many steps as possible.

This year the Green Team has completed many steps of the 4 levels of the GCC, including working with the office staff to reduce waste in the church buildings, connecting with UCC environmental ministries, creating a butterfly garden, installing bike racks in the parking lot and increasing the recycling and composting after church gatherings.

A grant of \$1,000 was given to the church for the specific use by the Green Team to help fulfill its mission.

Looking forward, the Green Team will connect with local environmental advocates and sustainability groups and continue to work on the GCC checklist. New members and suggestions are always welcome.

Honduras Hope

Honduras Hope would like to thank the WHCC for its many years of faithful support from the CSSB and members of the congregation. In December church members purchased pine needle baskets and hot pads made by the Plan Grande Women's Co-op from pine needles they gather locally. Over \$900 was raised! Proceeds from the sale helps these women support their families.





Honduras Hope is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that for more than 22 years has been working through long-term partnerships with two poor and marginalized communities: Plan Grande, a reservation for the Indigenous Tolupan people, and San José, a mountain community of squatters. Honduras Hope focuses on programs that provide a path out of poverty and toward a full and prosperous life in Honduras. These are just some of the things support from the WHCC makes possible:

- San José and 7 remote mountain communities have access to medical care at the San José Clinic, which is staffed by a full-time nurse.
- Each year an average of 18 university students receive scholarships, providing a path out of the culture of poverty.
- This year 16 teens from San José and 4 other mountain communities lived in the Honduras Hope Boarding House so they could attend high school in Yoro.
- This year 34 students from Plan Grande attended high school in Yoro with financial support from Honduras Hope. 7 seniors graduated in November.
- The Girls' Empowerment Program encourages Plan Grande teenage girls to stay in school. This year 5 of the HS graduates were members of the Girls' Empowerment Program.
- Regular tutoring sessions during the school year provide academic support.
- Plan Grande finally has electricity! Now students will have light at night for homework, computers & cell phones can be charged, and refrigeration and stoves become a possibility.
- Preschoolers receive a nourishing hot meal a minimum of twice a week.
- In Plan Grande, the Women's Co-op makes pine needle baskets and just qualified to receive government grants. Their income helps support their families.
- Dilapidated houses get repairs.
- Work is progressing on a new water system for San José. Since the old system failed, people must walk 3 hours to get water. More funding is needed to complete this project.

Food, clean drinking water, housing, and education...these are what your financial support brings to the people of San José and Plan Grande. But more than this, you bring hope for a better future to vulnerable and marginalized people. Praise God!

Habitat for Humanity 2023



Wellesley Hills Congregational Church's CSSB awarded a \$9,000 grant to Habitat for Humanity MetroWest/ Greater Worcester (HFHMWGW) this year. HFHMWGW will use the grants to support its mission of putting God's love into action by collaborating with their partners to build homes, communities, and hope in 42 central Massachusetts cities which comprise its mission zone. HFHMWGW achieves this humanitarian mission through direct funding from donors and a network of volunteers to build homes.

HFHMWGW builds safe and affordable homes for low-income families who do not qualify for mortgage programs. These families typically live in spaces that may be too small for the family size, unhealthy, unsafe, or unaffordable. Qualifying low-income families earn 30-60% of the median income earned by households in the communities where they live. HFHMWGW also assists families earning up to 80% of the area's median income to repair owner-occupied homes. Habitat assists low-income families regardless of age, race, ethnicity, faith, and background. The organization also helps veterans, families with autistic children, refugee families as well as homeless families.

WHCC's Habitat team went to Worcester, MA to paint playhouse kits for veteran families on March 18, 2023. Habitat's Operation Playhouse Program organizes volunteers from various organizations to build playhouses for the children of veteran and current military families.

We plan to participate in multiple projects in 2024 starting on January 13, 2024, during MLK weekend.

New Beginnings Wellesley Hills, Inc.



New Beginnings Wellesley Hills, Inc. entered our 35th year, continuing our mission to maintain a safe environment for adults to heal emotionally, spiritually, physically, and psychologically from the loss of a relationship due to spousal or family death, divorce, separation or other personal trauma. We are a self-directed, peer-to-peer, volunteer organization normally meeting weekly.

Covid-19 continued to complicate our planning, affected the ability to carry out our mission, and created financial challenges. Our organization's foundation and strength is person-to-person support and empathy. During most of the year, however, we met via a remote, on-line meeting scheme that attempted to create a community similar to weekly meetings. This was finally relaxed somewhat toward the end of the year, allowing us to meet in person within WHCC guidelines for safe gatherings. This was evaluated weekly, and remote meetings are still held as necessary. Some people will choose to remain in isolation out of an abundance of caution, and isolation is the #1 enemy of grief. So, we look forward to more stability and the pandemic's end.

In the face of the "new normal" of 2021, our administrative director, Jodi Pettingill, and her team managed to maintain the key administrative, outreach and compliance functions needed to keep the organization moving forward. The Board of Trustees thanks these dedicated people for their tireless efforts in 2021. New Beginnings offers a supportive and consistent environment for those we seek to help. While we are not professional counsellors, it is well documented that peer-facilitated small support groups are powerful tools that provide individualized attention, support and comfort for healing from the trauma of loss. This has been the core of New Beginnings from our founding more than three decades ago. Our success also results from dedicated hard-working volunteers who help further the New Beginnings mission.

Our primary groups include a widow/widowers group, a divorced/separated group, and a transition group, each currently with their own break-out meeting. The widow/widowers group and the divorced/separated group each deal with the all-important initial stages of those losses. A transition group, developed in 2021, helps members move forward successfully. Combined groups and self-development discussions are held as needed.

New Beginnings was recently blessed to receive support from the WHCC and the Christian Service Support Board, which we deeply appreciate! It is our honor and pleasure to be in the WHCC "family," and we look forward to this ongoing partnership to support our valuable ministry. We welcome your participation.

Wellesley Food Pantry (WFP)



The Wellesley Food Pantry, an independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, continues to operate under the original mission statement developed for its opening in 1989: *To provide supplemental and emergency food to Wellesley residents in need.*

WFP operates primarily on Mondays and Tuesdays – Mondays to receive, date check, sort, and store donations, as well as to restock shelves, and Tuesdays to distribute food to our clients.

We are currently serving approximately 190 households (the number can fluctuate on a weekly basis and has steadily been increasing this year), comprising about 400 individuals: 41% of our clients are age 60 or older; 28% are 18 or younger. Most families come to us for food once a month, although a handful come twice a month – another number that has been increasing in a year of escalating prices.



We are so generously supported by the Wellesley community with both food and financial donations. The vast majority of the funds we receive go to purchasing food, as we are all volunteers, and the church graciously provides the space in which we operate. We purchase hundreds of pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables each week and meat, fish, tofu, and other items for our refrigerators and freezers. We also buy nonperishable food when community donations are insufficient for our shelves to remain fully stocked. We are fortunate to have a wonderful donor who brings us dozens of jugs of milk every week.

The Hills Church has been an incredible partner in our shared mission to provide food to those in need, and our Board is so grateful for all the support you have provided over the years. The grant from the Christian Service Support Board is most welcome this year, as food costs have risen so dramatically.

We are thankful for the faithful service of WHCC parishioners currently volunteering at WFP, including Tricia Frank (also a board member), Chris Anne Banks, Tina Vasconcelles, George Pettee, Dana Brennan, Andrew Altenbach and Bob Minetti, and are also grateful for the support of the ever-cheerful and efficient Andrea Bellarosa.

Wellesley Nursery School in the Hills

Our mission at Wellesley Nursery School in the Hills is to provide a safe, nurturing, and developmentally appropriate learning environment for all children. We strive to foster creativity, exploration, and problem-solving skills, through our play-based, hands-on early learning program. With encouragement, children develop socially and emotionally to become responsible, independent, members of our school community. Expert teachers partner with families to provide an educational environment that allows children to develop to their full potential, while creating a lifetime love of learning.

The return to school this fall brought with it excitement and full classrooms! Parents attended

"Parent Night" and children visited their classrooms during orientation. All of the classes have enjoyed welcoming parents into the school during the day as guest readers and for special events. In addition, Music and Imagination, Be Ahead of the Game and special science programs visit monthly to provide interactive programs to all of the classes. The Wellesley Hills Branch Library hosts our PK and TK students monthly for book selection and a special story hour. WNSH families have enjoyed supporting the WHCC church missions at the annual WHCC Pumpkin Patch, donating to the clothing drive and delivering food to the Food Pantry.





WNSH's current school enrollment has increased steadily over the past four years. Our enrollment grew from 40 students in 2020-2021, to 65 students in 2021-2022, to 69 students in 2022-23 and now this year our school has 75 students enrolled. Registration for the 2024-25 school year is underway and we are currently at 65 registered students, with waitlists in the younger classrooms. Returning students/ siblings from Wellesley, Weston, Sherborn, Needham and Medfield as well as new families, make up the current enrollment numbers. With an increase in students, the rooms are staffed with two Lead Teachers and one Assistant Teacher. This allows us to maintain a low "student to teacher" ratio in each classroom. Families appreciate our ability to provide small group instruction and believe this sets us apart from other nursery school programs.

In addition, the Extended Day Program is offered three days per week from October -June. Children in PS1 & PS2 stay until 1:30 or 2:30 pm, enjoy lunch with friends, have extra playground time, and participate in stories and activities. PK & TK have an Extended Day option from 1:30-2:30 pm where they enjoy group games, special classroom activities and time on the playground.



As we look ahead to 2024, WNSH anticipates full classroom enrollment, a large extended day group and multiple opportunities for families to become partners in their child's educational journey. Our teachers continue to provide positive social and learning experiences for the children of Wellesley Nursery School in the Hills, making us one of the most desirable, respected preschools in the area.
